





Visual Drill

- Using the deck of alphabet cards appropriate for your child, (each grade was given a specific set and you can find each set on our Title website) show your child each card and have them make the sound or sounds for each letter/letter team
- For first and second graders, after you go through each card, sort them into piles of green, yellow, and red to use during the blending drill.

Blending Drill

- Using your child's deck of letter cards and the colored sorting mat, place all cards with colored dots on the matching colored squares.
- Your child should then touch each letter, make it's sound, and then blend the word together. Most of these combinations will not be real words.
 - For example, "th-a-f....thaf"

Auditory Drill

- Use the sheet sent home with your child (or found on our Title I webpage), that includes all of the letter sounds that they have learned so far
- Choose a letter and make its sound
 - some letters will be used more than once because they make more than one sound
 - For example: vowels (/a/ has a short and long sound)
 - The letter page sent home may be a helpful resource for letters that make more than one sound

Auditory Drill (continued)

 After you make a letter sound, your child should write the letter or letters that make that sound on their recording sheet. Each of the small boxes at the top of the page is for one way to make each sound.

Learning Routines

- 10 minutes of phonological (sound) practice
- 10 minutes of letter/spelling practice
- 10 minutes of sharing story
